## Hopi Boys Cross Country Team win 27th consecutive Championship Title

Hopi High School boys cross country took first place at the Arizona Interscholastic Association Cross Country State Championship for Division Four. This was

their 27th consecutive win, which is a national and state record. The race was run on a 3.1 mile race at Cave Creek Golf Course in Phoenix on Nov. 5.

Andre Denis, a senior at Hopi High, took fourth place overall out of 198 runners. Hopi had a score

of 56 points for the boys team. The Team consisted of seven runners: Steven Baker, Andre Denis, Tyrell Humeyestewa, DeWanye Laban, Andre Lucas, Jihad Nodman and Shaunanthony Pashano.

The Hopi High School girls cross country team took second

place in Division Four.

Jaeda Honani, a sophomore at Hopi High, also took fourth during the girls Division Four race.

Hopi girls scored 118 points out of the 23 teams participating.

Posting of colors was performed by the Hopi Jr./Sr. High School JROTC and the National Anthem was sung by Kalaila Namoki, and opening prayer by Philip Quochytewa Sr., Marine Corp. veteran.

A ceremony for the POW/MIA was presented by Sgt. First Class Joseph DeLeon, US Army, Ret. And Sgt. Karen Smiley, US Army, Veteran.

Special speakers were Vice Chairman Alfred Lomahquahu Jr., Marine

Corp. veteran, Miss Hopi CiAnna Sakeva and the Lori Piestewa Post #80 Princess and Attendants.

Vice Chairman Lomahquahu thanked everyone for supporting the veterans and their families, "We should be grateful we are living in a great country and be good to one another."

Miss Hopi thanked all veterans for their service and for being there to celebrate

"I don't know what it's like to have a veteran in the family because we don't have one," said Sakeva as she held on to a United States flag as she spoke. "I brought this flag in honor of my brother in-law who passed away. He did two tours in Iraq when he passed away. He left behind my sister, his wife and a little girl, my niece."

Major highlights of the event was recognizing the

last five known Hopi veterans of World War II. Clark Tenakhongva and Bruce Talawyma were given the task of researching and identifying these individuals.

The World War II veterans are: Ira Sakienema, 100 years old, soon to be 101 on Nov. 20, is Eagle clan from Hotevilla Village. After serving in Europe he came home and worked with the U.S. Postal Service for 30 years. He was married to Minnie (deceased) and they had eight children together; Belma, Zelda, Bonita, Jolane and Dealva are living and the other four have passed; Murray, Larry, Loman and Ruth.

Wayne Peesah, 94 years old is Kachina clan of Walpi. He served in the U.S. Air Force. He retired from the Polacca Day School where he worked as a custodian and bus driver.

# Cumulative Environmental Effects on Hopi Open House and Environmental Health Fair

On November 2, 2016, the Hopi Department of Health & Human Services and Hopi Environmental Protection Office held an open house and environmental health fair to let the Hopi people know about a new project the two programs are working on in partnership with the University of Arizona (U of A). The project is entitled “Cumulative Environmental Effects: the Hopi Environmental Health Project.” The main idea behind the environmental fair was to show case the new outdoor and indoor air quality monitoring equipment purchased through the project and to share what the monitors are capable of doing. Included in this fair was to begin communicating to the public how the project will work within the community. The Hopi Tribe has been without an air monitor for several years and the opportunity to work with the U of A will allow the environmental program to obtain information on current outdoor and indoor air quality to help assess potential adverse exposures to the Hopi people. The information gathered will be used to develop tribal environmental and health policies for a sustainable future. Ninety (90) homes will be randomly selected and homeowners will be given the consent opportunity to participate in the project. Indoor air

quality will be tested twice, once during the winter season and another during the summer season. This initial testing will allow the team to assess the overall findings to see what the major concerns are, that may impact one’s health in a home environment. There will also be several focus groups conducted on Hopi to identify environmental concerns the Hopi people have. These focus group sessions will begin in the New Year and will be conducted in first, second and third mesa areas. Those who are interested in participating with the group should contact the Hopi Health Department. A Community Advisory Board (CAB) has been working alongside the two programs to provide input

to the overall process of the project. The goal is to obtain as much information from the community to make sure that the project is addressing what the needs are of the community. Since the approval of Resolution A.I. 086/H -082-2016 in August, the team has been meeting and working together to plan, develop and prepare for the project. The team is ready to begin the second phase which is the recruitment of homes and begin making contact with home owners. The health and environmental programs would like to thank the community for great attendance in this important event. ## Tewa Community Building Burglarized

Sometime between 4 p.m., Saturday Nov. 5 and 7a.m., Monday Nov. 7, the Tewa Community Building was broken into and vandalized. Facility Manager Claude Pahona said he arrived at 7:45 a.m. and came through the main entrance of the building and noticed a door knob on the floor. He immediately checked the entire building as he normally does and noticed the back door to the commons area was open. The door was forcibly open with what Pahona believes to be a crowbar and he immediately called the Hopi BIA (Bureau of Indian Affairs) Police to report the break-in. Pahona notified Phyllis Wittsell, Tewa Community Service Administrator (CSA) who was on her way to work; when she arrived she assessed the damage before an officer arrived. The BIA Officer took photos but couldn’t take any fingerprints because they don’t have the equipment for it. Since Wittsell requested fingerprinting of the scene, the officer borrowed fingerprinting equipment from Hopi Resource Enforcement Services (HRES) who responded. Wittsell was too emotional and in disbelief that someone could do this and could not begin to tell what the estimated cost of damage was going to be. “This is personally devastating,” said Wittsell. “This village has been and is still going through a lot. With the budget cuts, the Board will have to

identify funds for the repairs. This will indefinitely affect some of the services we provide to the community.” Pahona said all of the damaged doors were specially ordered from Bernalillo, NM which cost \$200 each. The door and door frames on a majority of the offices and back entrance where the perpetrators came through was damaged beyond repair. The door knobs were broken off the doors as well. “It looks like they may have used a crow bar to get into the building,” said Pahona who became upset and emotional. “I feel like I’ve been attacked personally and it hurts me. I have worked hard to keep this building up to par.” Pahona said he can’t believe these people would do this to a building that provides services to the community, and not just Tewa village members. There was damage to all of the administrative offices which was ransacked as the thieves went through all of the drawers and cabinets. The thieves broke into every cash box in each of the offices and the two safes inside the accountants’ office. Carlton Timms, Youth Coordinator said he noticed several things missing from his from office; a 45” Vizio flat screen television, a Power Point projector and an older model Dell laptop. Timms was going to return the television because there was crack on the top middle of the screen. As of press time he couldn’t tell if there was anything else missing from his office as they were told to stay out until the fin-

gerprinting. In addition to the items missing from Timms office, Wittsell was also missing her new laptop as well. Timms said the items that were taken are used to provide services to the community and for movie nights which draws large crowds. “This feels like an insult to us because the village has been through so much and maybe this will finally get the Hopi Tribe Realty Office to push the Service Line Agreements (SLA) through so we can get electricity,” said Wittsell. “The SLA’s were recently approved to get water, telephone line and electricity but is still being delayed.” Timms and Pahona said this motivates them to be stronger. Although it will hinder services they both agreed to be proactive. “What goes around comes around,” said Timms. “We are not defeated.” Pahona said he feels sorry for the individual’s families and this will only make the village of Tewa stronger. “What they did to us hurts; I’m mad and upset, but I’m not going to take it personally,” said Pahona. Wittsell said this will affect some of the activities and services they provide to the families of Tewa village for a short time or until they can properly secure the building again. “We need to respect one another,” said Wittsell. “We need to come together as a community and look out for one another.”

### Veterans Day from P1

Clarence Lomayestewa, 94 years old is Snow clan from Shungopavi. Lomayestewa served in the U.S. Army; after serving his country he worked as a heavy equipment operator and raised a large family of eight. His son Lawrence Koyayesva and Clarendia Lomayestewa represented their father who was not able to make it to the event. Peter Nuvamsa Jr., 90 years old is Snow clan of Shungopavi who served in the U.S. Army. He worked at Shungopavi Day School and Second Mesa Day School as custodian, from which he retired. Paul Tsimoga, of Bacavi is married at Moenkopi served in the U.S.

Army. He worked and lived most of his life in Moenkopi. He was also a recipient of the Purple Heart. “These veterans didn’t have the modern technology, the equipment as today’s military,” said Tenakhongva. “These guys were real ground pounders. They didn’t have the luxury of getting on trucks; they suffered out there in the trenches, in the cold European trenches.” These individuals were recognized for their service and were presented with a gift of a vest and World War II Veterans cap. The vests were sewn by Ann Tenakhongva. There was also a Polynesian dance performed by the Teutupe family of

Shungopavi and singing by the Blue Bear Drum group. Veterans who attended the event were given some military surplus. # November is American Diabetes Month

Here are some tips to cook healthier meals by making replacements or changing your cooking methods. Many of the extra calories and unhealthy fats come from the excess oil that is used when cooking meals. Many of the healthy nutrients and vitamins are also lost in the cooking process. By making small adjustments to your cooking methods you can still have the same tasty food. Instead of frying, try cooking your meals by broiling, microwaving, baking, roasting, steaming or by grilling. Try to avoid frying your food in lots of oil, lard or butter. The high temperature used in frying can produce toxins such as amines, acrylamides and sulphur compounds. Throw away old frying oil and grease, the reheated oil/grease can destroy the good antioxidants in the food you are preparing. IT IS OK to use some fat when cooking! Use oil that is high in unsaturated fats. Unsaturated fats are the good fats and come from plant sources such as nuts and seeds for example olive, peanut, safflower, sunflower, soybean, corn, flaxseed and coconut oils. Cooking sprays are great

to use as well when only a small amount of oil is needed in a recipe or meal. Use just enough oil to coat your pan or use the recommended amount if you are cooking from a recipe. Many of the oils mentioned are tasty and can be used to flavor your food in a variety of ways. A final tip for you is to check your pots and pans. We all have that favorite pan that we cook in, but is it starting to get food stuck to it, making you use more oil/grease to coat when cooking? Invest in purchasing nonstick pots and pans that are coated in protective synthetics which will help you use less oils/grease when cooking. ## 2016 Diabetes Expo held on Nov. 7

In recognition of Diabetes Awareness month the Hopi Special Diabetes program hosted the 2016 Diabetes Expo on Nov. 07 at the Hopi Veterans Memorial Center. The event line up included several presenters such as Steven Pattea, Ann Collier, Prescott Youth Camp attendees and several cooking demonstrators such as Teresa Kulpinski, Iva Honyestewa and Susan Sekaquptewa. The event also included fitness sessions from Sensei Andy, Ute Indian Tribe: Painted Horse Diabetes Program, and the Native American Fitness Council. Master of Ceremonies were Leon Nuvayestewa Sr. and Beatrice Norton who kept the momentum going throughout the expo and giving factual information on diabetes. Many local, state and county resources had booths where they educated families and individuals on their programs and the importance of good health. Felicia Mata, Hopi Women’s, Infants and Children (WIC) program spoke of diabetes and breastfeeding. She said some mothers feel it’s unsafe for them to breastfeed because they have diabetes and think they will pass it on to their babies. “They are not at risk of giving their baby’s diabetes and its actually better and healthier for the mothers to breastfeed their babies,” said Mata. Mata said they have seen an increase of babies and children with digestive problems and they do not know what may be causing it which requires them to give special formula. Chelsea Kidd of the Ute Indian Tribe: Painted Horse Diabetes Program traveled all the way from Ft. Duchesne to be a part of the Hopi Diabetes Expo said she liked the event and the energy during the event. They host exercise activities and physical fitness classes for its community members. They also have a 100 mile club and every person who completes their miles receives a pair of Nike N7 shoes. The cooking demonstration was a big hit for attendees as Honyestewa made a tradi-

tional dish of blue cornmeal marbles with öngatoki, annual salt weed. Honyestewa said she has incorporated a lot traditional plants into her diet and urged everyone to do the same because it helps with high blood pressure and diabetes. Sekaquptewa brought with her vegetables she grew in her garden; leeks, kale, potatoes, carrots, onions, chilies, tomatoes and much more. She said she harvested many pounds of vegetables and still hasn’t weighed everything. She made leek and potatoes soup for her cooking demonstration and gave away some kale. Motivational speaker Pattea is Hopi/Yavapai from the village of Old Oraibi and currently lives in Ft. McDowell. He has Type 2 diabetes; when he found out, he said he was in denial. “I had to learn about it and deal with it,” said Pattea. His motivation is being a father and a grandfather. He educated himself on diabetes and got in the habit of looking at the labels, especially for the words “genetically engineered”. “You have to have faith, hope, music and culture,” said Pattea. “Always strive to do the best we can.” He told everyone to follow these three simple rules: always learn, always keep yourself motivated and love yourself. Valerie Nuvayestewa, Diabetes Prevention Educator said feels the expo was well attended, but does not have the exact count of how many people attended. “Last year we had the expo during the day and this year we thought we would have it during the evening since many people are off work and can attend with their families,” said Nuvayestewa. She added they will be hosting other activities throughout the month of November to recognize National Diabetes Awareness month. She encouraged everyone to go out and exercise and look out for of their activities within the community.

## Hopi Social Services Trunk or Treat

The Hopi Social Services Program held a Trunk or Treat on Halloween in front of their offices in Polacca; a free event for everyone. Eva Sekayumptewa, Director of Social Services said the idea of a Trunk or Treat was that of a 12 year old boy who is in the Foster Care program. “He was feeling lonesome and missed his family, and wanted to do something with other children in the program,” said Sekayumptewa. The boy (identity withheld for confidentiality reasons) wanted a haunted house, but because it was late notice to plan a haunted house, Sekayumptewa and her staff came up with the idea of a Trunk or Treat. “We reached out to tribal programs and law enforcement to be a part of this event,” said Sekayumptewa. “And since we don’t have funds to purchase decorations, the staff used their own money or donated.”

The staff made a list of things they needed and pitched-in to make the event possible; the local country band “Sun Fire” was also invited to the event. Families were treated to a free meal of hotdogs, chips and beans; and children had their chance at winning a pickle by participating in the pickle walk. The Social Service staff was divided up into teams and each team decorated a program vehicle, along with other programs such as the Hopi Department of Public Safety and Emergency Services, Hopi Emergency Medical Services and the Hopi Tewa Women’s Coalition to End Abuse. Within the first hour of starting the Trunk or Treat, many vehicles started to come through almost causing a traffic jam, but with the assistance from Walpi security it was controlled. Sekayumptewa said she was happy to see the smiles on the children as they came by with their parents, “Even

the parents looked like they were having a great time.” She said they wanted the event to be positive because they are often viewed negatively for taking children from their home and families. “Splitting families is not our mission, our goal is make sure children are safe,” said Sekayumptewa. The idea of the Trunk or Treat has been trending on the reservation as many organizations have hosted them over the past week; Sekayumptewa said its much safer than having to go from house to house because you don’t know what is behind that closed door. “You never know what kind of condition the person is in behind that door,” said Sekayumptewa. “It’s just a lot safer to have the Trunk or Treat because it’s out in the open.” Sekayumptewa said she would like to thank her staff for their commitment to the children they serve and sacrificing their time they could be at home with family.

## Active Shooter drill implemented at Hopi Jr./Sr. High School

Just before school started on the morning of Nov. 2, a student of Hopi Jr./Sr. High School (HJSHS) walked into the cafeteria where students were having breakfast and opened fire. As many as 13 students were reported injured while others escaped unharmed. The school was immediately put on lockdown and law enforcement was called to neutralize the situation and evacuate the building. Fortunately, this was only a scenario of the ‘Active Shooter Exercise’ that took place at HJSHS. Several local and County organizations participated in the drill to prepare and make improvements in their emergency responses, should an actual incident occur. Velleda Sidney, Public Health Emergency Preparedness (PHEP) Coordinator with the Hopi Department of Public Safety and Emergency Services (DPSES) said the exercise took almost a year to come to fruition. “We began the tabletop discussion in December of last year and since that time we have been coordinating the exercise,” said Sidney. “Preparation for the exercise included a lot of training and exercises on behalf of the planning team and the school. The school had evacuation and lockdown drills.” The goal of the exercise is to have HJSHS engage in an active shooter drill to practice their protocols when going into a lockdown and evacuation mode; which includes calling 911 and reporting an active shooter in the school.


Not only was the exercise for the school, but those involved in responding to an emergency situation. The exercise focused on response time and recovery efforts of law enforcement and emergency responders. Garland Navakuku, HJSHS Lead Facilities said the exercise was something they have been trying to work on over the years and with the help of Sidney it has finally been done. “With this exercise we know there is a lot that needs to be done as far as corrective action,” said Navakuku. The exercise was played out in front of observers who were invited and given a designated area to observe; observers were from local elementary schools, community offices and local agencies. The exercise included players, controllers, simulators, evaluators and support staff. Players were personnel who played an active role in discussing or performing their regular roles and responsibilities during the exercise. A majority of the HJSHS staff participated, along with 50 students who were randomly selected to play. Evaluators evaluate and provide feedback on a designated functional area of the exercise. They observe and document performance against established capability targets and critical tasks, in accordance with the Exercise Evaluation Guides. Many of the evaluators were from surrounding agencies and organizations off the Hopi reservation.

During the “hot wash” (conclusion of the exercise), the evaluators gave their feedback and suggestions on each of the players they evaluated. Most of the evaluators felt players did a good job overall, but said they all needed to work on communication. Jason Secakuku of Shonto School was an evaluator during the exercise and said he noticed the school using green and red cards which were slipped under the door which indicates someone is in the room or something is wrong. “We went away from using these cards because of safety reasons,” said Secakuku. Secakuku also said that during situations such as an active shooter, all resources needs to be used no matter what agency. He questioned why the Hopi Resource Enforcement Services did not participate. “You’re not counting on your own resources,” said Secakuku. “They need to be played; all the other agencies off reservation are here. I don’t live out here, but I take these kinds of exercises very seriously.” Sidney said the challenge in preparing for the exercise was bringing all of the organizations to the table, especially emergency personnel. She felt the response time was lengthy but said that is how it usually is when you’re in that type of situation. She also said students need to learn basic triage and learn how to take care of one another in emergency situations “They need to know what their policies

are and what their capabilities are on a daily basis,” said Sidney. “If they don’t know these things, it affects their planning and knowing what their roles and responsibilities are if something should happen.” Sidney said she would like to thank all the emergency response teams who made it to the exercise. There were a total of over 65 emergency personnel who responded. The following is a list of agencies and organizations who participated in the “Active Shooter Exercise”: Hopi BIA Education Agency; Hopi Jr. / Sr. High School; Hopi BIA Facilities Management; Hopi BIA Police; Hopi BIA Structure Fire; Hopi Health Care Center; Arizona Department of Public Safety; Arizona Department of Emergency Management; Arizona Department of Health Services; Arizona Department of Transportation; Apache County Sheriff’s Office; Hopi Emergency Medical Services; Hopi Department of Transportation; Hopi Tribe Public Health Emergency Preparedness; Hopi Structural / Rescue Fire; Northland Pioneer College, Hopi Campus; Hopi Department of Public Safety and Emergency Services; Navajo County Emergency Management; Navajo County Public Works; Navajo County Sheriff’s Office; Navajo Nation Emergency Medical Services; Navajo Nation Police Department; Navajo Area IHS Office; and Private Organizations such as KUYI, Hopi Tutuveni and Nava-Hopi Observer.

The Hopi Tribe in conjunction with the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) is preparing a Woodlands Management Plan for the Hopi Indian Reservation, located in Navajo County, Arizona. The Woodlands Management Plan scope includes the main Hopi Reservation forest base with the Moenkopi District exempted from planning due to lack of significant forest base. The purpose of the Woodlands Management Plan is to set management direction for the Hopi Indian Reservation woodland forest for the next 10 years and establish a focus for the long-term. Isolated riparian forest stands, largely found along riparian areas of the five major ephemeral washes on the main Reservation are outside the planning scope. The Woodlands Management Plan will be reviewed annually for its adequacy and detail or at any other time deemed appropriate by the Tribal Council. The management plan will include a statement describing the manner in which the policies of the tribe will be applied, a range of silviculture treatments that may be used across the forest to achieve specific goals and objectives, and the goals and objectives for management of the Hopi Tribe woodlands. The Woodlands Management Plan will be based on the principles of sustained yield management and multiple use, and objectives established by the tribe.

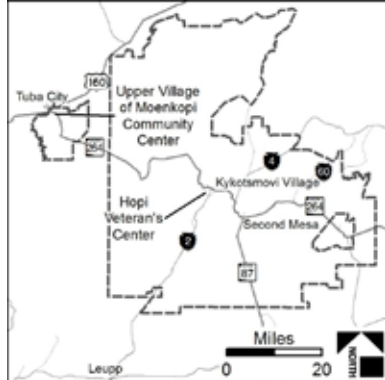
Concurrent to the preparation of the Woodlands Management Plan, an Environmental Assessment (EA) is being prepared under government contract by Logan Simpson for final approval by the BIA Hopi Agency. The EA will be completed in accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) and other applicable federal, state, and local environmental regulations; tribal regulations, and the BIA NEPA Guidebook 59 IAM 3-H (guidebook).

To ensure that the full range of issues related to these proposed forest management activities are addressed and all significant issues identified, we invite you to provide any specific concerns, suggestions, or recommendations for consideration in the development of the Woodlands Management Plan. # Fuhr on mission to complete unity pipe

Joel Fuhr is a wanderer of the Earth and made a stop on the Hopi Reservation on his mission to find artists from all federally recognized Native American tribes; including those not recognized, to complete what he calls the “Unity Pipe”.

He envisions the pipe to be complete with a stem, bead work and carrying case that will be decorated by all of the Native American tribes.

“It will be the work of mankind,” said Fuhr. “That is the whole goal.”

The main portion of the pipe is made of Minnesota pipestone; he said it is not the sacred pipestone but it comes from the quarry next to it.

Fuhr said the pipe will travel to the artists and where ever the artists get their inspiration from, he added there are simple rules to follow and that is to never bring negativity to the pipe.

Fuhr said the pipe was used in Standing Rock where over 300 traditional leaders, healers and shamans of all tribal nations smoked from the pipe. The idea for the unity pipe began when he was gifted a pipe from Walden Poor Bear, which belonged to Poor Bear’s grandfather.

“I was at a homeless shelter and I left it out in the open in my car,” said Fuhr. “My doors were locked, but when I came back outside, it was gone..”

Because Poor Bear gave him his grandfather’s pipe, Fuhr said he will have the responsibility of taking care of the pipe.

So why did he Fuhr come to Hopi first?

He said he was given a sign when he saw Kokopelli in the sky on his way back to Colorado from South Dakota. While here on Hopi, he hopes to find an artist that will begin decorating the pipe with their artwork.

Fuhr figures it will take three years to complete the pipe after going to all the tribal communities . This will be a challenge for him.

“The only challenge would be finding the right person or people to take the pipe on its journey to different nations,” said Fuhr.

He would like to bring the whole planet together and this is one part of what he is doing by creating the “Unity Pipe”.

Fuhr has been homeless for three to four years; he lived in Nebraska and Texas before moving to Colorado. He doesn’t consider himself homeless because he considers the Earth to be his home.

# Hopi Library and staff receive distinguished Library Award

The Hopi Public Library’s mobile library services (bookmobile and mobile computer lab) were recently awarded the International Guardians of Culture and Lifeways Library Institutional Excellence Award by the Association of Tribal Archives, Libraries and Museums (ATALM).

Dinah Pongyesva, Hopi Public Library Assistant and Director Noreen Sakiestewa attended the International Conference of Indigenous Archives, Libraries, and Museums in Phoenix, to accept the award.

The Hopi bookmobile visits twelve villages on the Hopi Reservation on a regular basis four days a week. The mobile computer lab provides Internet access on public access computers to five villages.

Hopi library staff are very deserving of this award as they bring library services to remote areas under often difficult circumstances and inclement weather.

Pongyesva was also rawarded the 2016 AzLA Outreach Services award during the Arizona Libraries Association Conference in Tucson, Az.

# Hopi Library receives Institutional Excellence Award

The Library Institutional Excellence Award was presented to the Hopi Public Library and its director, Dr. Noreen Sakiestewa. Under Sakiestewa’s leadership, the Hopi Public Library program is now a vibrant institution providing highly-valued services to the Hopi reservation, after previously closing its doors and placing its materials in long-term storage.

Working with the Navajo County Library District, Sakiestewa successfully pursued grant funding to implement bookmobile service to the reservation and a few years later, again acquired grant funding to add a mobile computer lab to provide internet access and public computers. This dual mobile service in a remote, challenging environment is the first of

its kind on any Indian reservation.

In implementing the service, the Hopi culture and language was promoted by holding a contest for tribal members to design the artwork for the two mobile vehicles and worked with the Cultural Preservation Office to give Hopi names to both vehicles. The Hopi Tribe now has library services with a strong collection of Hopi and Native American material.
