## U.S. Congressman Tom O'Halleran visits Hopi Jr. Sr. High School

U.S. Rep. Tom O'Halleran spoke about education and other federal issues Aug. 14 when he kicked off the school year as the guest at Hopi Jr/Sr High School.

O'Halleran, who represents the district that includes Hopi, Navajo and much of northern Arizona, said elected officials need to work together, respect each other and be more transparent with the people and Congress.

O'Halleran spoke to the students during an assembly and then had a live chat with HJSHS Superintendent Steven Berbeco, Ed.D on KUYI Hopi radio.

In response to a student question, O'Halleran said he makes \$174,000 per year.

Another student asked if he had met President Trump and if he agreed with him. O'Halleran responded that he has not met Trump and disagrees with him on many issues. He said the president should work with people rather than making threats.

O'Halleran said if America needs to be defended that they should do it, but only after all other options have been exhausted.

O'Halleran said educators need to get back to running the schools.

"It is not my job to tell you how to run your schools," he said.

O'Halleran said the federal government should better fund schools, but should let the educators do their jobs. He said he is only one voice in Congress.

"But you are many," he said.

For example, there are proposed cutbacks to the Meals on Wheels program that serves

senior citizens. He said a number of seniors sent a ton of paper plates to Congress to make their point that this program is needed. His point is that the people need to contact their congressional representatives when they want to voice their opinions.

"We have to change minds, but we need to do that by working with them," he said.

O'Halleran has joined a congressional group called the Problem Solvers that is a bipartisan group working toward solving problems. We're working together out of mutual respect," he said.

## State Legislators commend Hopi Councilman Keevama on economic development efforts

Reactions of dismay have been consistent throughout Villages and Hopi Tribal Programs and Employees as they submit their FY2018 General Fund Operating Budgets, at a mandated 12% cut.

With dwindling revenue in the Hopi Tribe's coffers and the looming closure of the Navajo Generating Station, the Tribal Council issued a directive to cut the 2018 budget by 12% for all entities receiving General Fund monies. The Tribe's main source of revenue is through the sale of its coal to Peabody Coal Co. who mine the coal then sell it to NGS to generate electricity.

In June, the Navajo Nation Council, after negotiations

with Owners of NGS, approved a lease for the plant to remain open through the end of 2019 giving both Tribes a little more time to plan for their financial future.

Hopi Tribal leaders immediately created a Task Team to seek and create economic development opportunities to begin generating new revenue for the Hopi Tribe. They also created another Task Team to identify all current financial revenue and assets of the Tribe and come up with solutions on how to lower financial expenditures.

Hopi Tribal Council Representative Lamar Keevama placed the Tribe's financial situation as a priority and active-

ly researched and advocated for ways in which to help the Tribe find alternative revenue and achieve financial stability, through economic development opportunities.

Keevama's efforts in his quest for economic development and financial independence for the Hopi Tribe, did not go unnoticed.

On August 15, Arizona State Legislators Judy Burges, Sonny Borrelli, Steve Smith and Mark Finchem sent a letter to Keavama acknowledging his "incredibly faithful work attempting to bring new economic development and independence to the Hopi Tribe; the Hopi people."

The letter further states: “Ever since the announcement of the shuttering of the Navajo Generating Station, we have heard your views, and actually participated with you in meetings and presentations where your commitment to the Hopi Tribal future has been most evident. You testifying during the legislative field hearing in Page, AZ was impressive, professional, and informative”…… “please accept this letter of appreciation for the dedication you have shown by accomplishing hard research, creating consensus among your Tribal Council members, looking after the economic future of your people, and willingness to bring down walls of division and distrust. Working with you on the NGS concerns has been rewarding and soon many will know how critical your portion in all the meetings, negotiations, and guidance was”… “The Hopi Nation is fortunate to have a leader like you!” Tribal leaders agree that

the Hopi Government has to find ways to deal with the many challenges their constituents and villages face, daily. The loss of coal sales as its main revenue source only hampers efforts to achieve financial stability for the Hopi government. However, economic development efforts cannot rest solely with the Hopi Tribal Council, but requires cooperative efforts and involvement by the entire Hopi community and villages.

# O’Halleran from P1

Afterward, O’Halleran said he tremendously enjoyed his time on Hopi. On a more serious note, he said there is a tremendous funding difference in various districts because of the difference tax bases. “We need to level the field,” he said. “We want to make sure we get more money and spread it around efficiently.” O’Halleran said standardized tests are changed too often and should be left alone for a decade. He said education needs more funding both in the state and in the nation. He said people on the East Coast have no idea what the people on the West Coast go through in terms of problems with water. O’Halleran said Congress needs to have more of a vision with the future rather than dealing with problems when they become a crisis.

O’Halleran said he ran for Congress after serving in the state legislature, and seeing that the elected officials did not treat the citizens well. Berbeco said this day was special and hoped the students felt a connection to all the other students who were in class in other states and other countries. “Today we bring together people who support you,” he told the students. Berbeco said O’Halleran is working to create a better job, better land, water and air for the people. Berbeco also introduced Hopi Chairman Herman Honanie to the students. He said it was an honor to recognize the Chairman because the chairman saw who he wanted to be and took those steps. Chairman Honanie praised Superintendent Berbeco for giving the students words of inspiration. “Education is very very important,” he said. Chairman Honanie spoke about past Hopi leaders who told their people that they should take the good of the Hopi and the good from the white man so that they could have a better life. “They were not educated, but they saw the future was in education,” he said. Chairman Honanie told the students to talk to their teachers and administrators about what they want to learn. He pointed out that his wife has a Master’s degree and two of his assistants graduated from law school. He also told the students to listen to their parents and grandparents. “We have a great Hopi Nation,” he said. Chairman Honanie told the students to look back at their values which include humility and respect.

Honani, a 16 year old junior, said her running improved because she ran a majority of the summer, which she didn’t do last year.

“It makes a difference,” she said.

Unfortunately, her teammates did not run during most of the summer and the Lady Bruins finished in fifth place.

“They ran some during the summer, but they weren’t as persistent as I was,” she said.

Honani dealt with knee problems last year, but this year she has been healthy so far.

“I just need to do a lot of stretching and dynamic workouts,” she said. “My goal is to do better at state this year and help the team win state.”

Honani said she has no problems keeping her grades up during the cross country season, and she likes run-

ning for Hopi High Coach Rick “The Legend” Baker.

“It’s a lot better because his workouts are harder. They build strength. I also enjoy his motivational talks,” she said.

Honani hopes to earn a cross country scholarship to college, but hasn’t decided where she wants to attend college. She wants to major in engineering.

Baker, who coaches girls and boys, said neither team ran to expectations. The Lady Bruins placed fifth out of 11 teams. The Hopi boys placed sixth out of 13 teams.

“It wasn’t too good. We have to make some adjustments and start our workouts,” he said.

Baker said the Hopi girls did not run to their potential because most of them didn’t run during the summer.

“This is a good indication of the work we need to do,” he said.

The weather was hot, but Baker said that was no excuse for a poor run because all of the runners had to run in the heat. Coach Baker said Honani ran a good race but the other runners were too far back.

“We need to close the gap between Jaeda and the rest of the runners,” he said.

Baker said the girls could improve by coming to prac-

tice, working hard, staying healthy and injury free. He said the team goal is to get in shape and improve one meet at a time.

Baker said the boys didn’t run to his expectations. He said Jihad Nodman and Steven Baker ran well, but he said the next three runners were too far back. Nodman finished in 12<sup>th</sup> place and Baker came in 16<sup>th</sup> in the 101 runner race.

“The other three need to move up,” he said. “We need to close the gap between the number two and number three men.”

Baker said the boys could improve by running in a pack.

He said the goal for the boys for the season is to “stick to the process, believe in the process and work hard.”

Baker said all of the runners were academically eligible. He encourages them to stay on top of their work and to go to tutoring. He also tells his runners to stay away from drugs and alcohol because they are dangerous.

“You will never reach your potential if you’re into drugs and alcohol,” he said.

## Donated “National Treasure” of Hopi Pottery Masterworks, to go on exhibit September 16 at Scottsdale’s Museum of the West

**SCOTTSDALE, Ariz.** More than 65 of the finest examples of Hopi pottery will go on exhibit for the first time Saturday, September 16, 2017 when the “Canvas of Clay: Hopi Pottery Masterworks from The Allan and Judith Cooke Collection” exhibition opens at Western Spirit: Scottsdale’s Museum of the West.

Spanning six centuries, the exhibition explores the history and stylistic traditions of the Hopi, who have excelled in the creation of ceramics for generations. Among the historic and contemporary masterworks are 18 ceramics by Nampeyo of Hano (Hopi/Tewa, c. 1860-1942), the most famous of the Hopi potters. Twenty-two other master potters are also represented in the exhibition, including Nampeyo’s daughters and other descendants.

The exhibition includes approximately half of The Allan and Judith Cooke Collection, one of the finest private collections of Hopi pottery, which has been gifted to the museum. Ceramics from the collection will be permanently featured in a new museum gallery, The Allan and Judith Cooke Gallery. Sponsored by the City of Scottsdale, the gallery honors the donor and his late wife, and the Hopi people whose tribal land lies in northern Arizona.

Exhibitions of ceramics from the Cooke collection will be in ongoing rotation in the new, permanent gallery. The inaugural “Canvas of Clay” exhibition is

scheduled September 16, 2017 through December 2019. Native American guests will receive free museum admission September 16, 2017 through December 30, 2018. The museum is located in downtown Scottsdale, Arizona, at 3830 N. Marshall Way.

“The City of Scottsdale is privileged to provide its residents and the millions of annual visitors to our community with the opportunity to see this national treasure first-hand,” commented Scottsdale Mayor W.J. “Jim” Lane. “It serves as a point of pride not only for the city, but for the state of Arizona.”

“We are honored to be entrusted with this exquisite collection,” said Mike Fox, museum director/CEO. “This exhibition is an ongoing tribute to the people of Hopi, and as such serves as an important resource for research, education and inspiration for the tribe, our local community, students, artisans and visitors worldwide. We are deeply appreciative of Dr. Cooke’s generosity and this opportunity to celebrate these gifted artists.”

“It’s amazing to see how far back Hopi pottery goes, and the awesome condition the ceramics are in,” commented Rose Hawee, Hopi cultural advisor to the museum. “This permanent exhibit provides the tribe, and all people, with the opportunity to enjoy the Hopi’s legacy, and realize how important it is. Hopefully, it will also encourage the younger generation to continue making pottery.”

According to Tricia Loscher,

chief curator of Scottsdale’s Museum of the West, Native American artists played a vital role in transforming Scottsdale from a small farming and ranching community into a nationally acclaimed creative and artistic regional hub. Among the best known are fashion and textile designer Lloyd Kiva New (Cherokee) and jeweler and potter Charles Loloma (Hopi), who have inspired generations of Native American artists with their innovative designs.

Shortly after World War II, New founded Scottsdale’s Craftsman Court on Main Street and then, in the early 1950s, the highly successful Kiva Craft Center (a series of small shops operated by individual artists) on Scottsdale’s Fifth Avenue. Loloma and his wife Otellie Loloma (Hopi) were the first tenants of the Kiva Craft Center.

“This collection tells seven centuries of stories about Hopi life and culture, and speaks to how the cultural legacy of the Hopi pottery tradition is carried on today by the descendants who create their own masterful ceramics,” commented Loscher. “Having these pots return to Arizona, and placed on permanent exhibit in Scottsdale, is especially relevant given the integral role Native American artists and their artworks played in elevating the city’s cultural standing.”

**About the Collector** - Allan Cooke, M.D., and his wife Judith (1945-2001) began collecting indigenous Southwestern pottery more than 25 years ago

after a driving vacation to Santa Fe, New Mexico from the couple’s home in Kansas City, Kansas. On that trip, they visited several Pueblo ancestral centers, where they first learned about Native American ceramics and the potters who created them. They purchased six jars, one of which was made by a Hopi potter, before returning home.

Their passion for Hopi pottery grew over the years, as did their collection. The Cookes admired not only the Hopi potters’ sculpture and painting skills, but also their manual craftsmanship. Traditional Hopi potters hand coil and scrape the clay, sculpting the pot or bowl with extraordinary sensitivity, without using a mechanized wheel to throw a vessel.

In time, the Cookes’ Hopi pottery collection grew to reflect the evolution of Hopi ceramics over seven centuries, spanning all of the major Hopi stylistic traditions. The more than 120 pieces in The Allan and Judith Cooke Collection include early black on white ware; 14th-through 16th-century Sikyatki polychrome (multi-color) masterworks characterized by exuberantly painted and sculpted ceramics; and more fluid, artistic interpretations by Hopi potters of the 20th and 21st centuries.

As a professor of medicine at the University of Kansas, Kansas City, Kansas, Cooke became aware of Scottsdale’s Museum of the West. “After touring the museum, hearing what the museum’s director had to say

about the aims for the future of the enterprise and the sincerity of the vision, I must say I was most impressed,” Cooke commented. “I believe the leadership will make this a great museum. For these reasons and others, I am gifting my collection of Hopi pottery to the Museum of the West.”

The story of Hopi pottery, illustrated by individual ceramics from the Cooke collection, is told in the book “Canvas of Clay: Seven Centuries of Hopi Ceramic Art” by Edwin Wade and Allan Cooke. In addition to being a scholar and interpreter of Southwestern ceramics, co-author Wade has a background in museum management and private and institutional curation. Published in 2012 by El Otro Lado Press, Sedona, Arizona, the richly illustrated catalogue of the collection is available from the museum store (hard cover signed by the authors, \$75; unsigned paperback edition, \$34.95).

“Each piece in The Allan and Judith Cooke Collection is the finest example of Hopi ceramics,” Wade said. “The collection is unparalleled.”

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
