The Hopi Senom Transit and the Hopi Veterans services had a dedication ceremony of a new public transportation bus displaying the Hopi code Talker emblem. The ceremony was held on Oct. 20 in honor of the Hopi Code Talkers, all veterans and all active military personnel.

According to Transit Administrator Donovan Gomez, it was the idea of Transit Supervisor Shawn Silas to mount the Hopi Code Talker emblem on the bus. Silas shared his idea with Hopi Veterans Services Manager Eugene Talas. Talas was very cooperative and instrumental in making this a reality.

Talas served as Master of Ceremonies and explained that he had contacted the U.S. Mint about displaying the Hopi Code Talker emblem on the bus. The US Mint advised him that the image belonged to the Hopi Tribe and they could use it at their discretion. A graphics company from Phoenix did the design based on samples of the medallion and the Hopi flag.

The Hopi Senom Transit does not receive any funding from the Hopi Tribe's General Fund and is totally dependent on grant funding from outside sources.

Chairman Honanie thanks Navajo Nation Tribal Council for saving land sacred to both Tribes

Kykotsmovi, Ariz. - Hopi Tribal Chairman Herman G. Honanie today thanked the Navajo Tribal Council for its decision on October 31 to oppose development at one of the Seven Natural Wonders of the World, the Grand Canyon. The Navajo Council voted against the proposed multimillion-dollar project, the "Grand Canyon Escalade," that included a gondola tramway into the revered Canyon. That land is sacred to both Tribes. In a letter a year ago, Chairman Honanie urged the Navajo Council not to support the 420-acre tourism

proposal planned by a Scottsdale developer, noting the proposal would "irreversibly compromise the tranquility and sacredness" of areas the Hopi Tribe has held sacred for at least a thousand years.

"The Hopi Tribe and many other Southwestern Tribes including the Navajo Nation hold the Grand Canyon as a sacred place of reverence, respect and conservation stewardship. It is important to preserve and protect these sites from harm and wrongful exploitation," the Chairman said in the October, 2016 letter to the Navajo leaders.

Though the media sometimes have emphasized differences between the two tribes, Chairman Honanie said, today is a day for rejoicing the Tribes' common respect for each other's sacred commitments: "The Navajo and Hopi people are and shall remain neighbors, and desire to live in harmony with mutual respect for each other for all future generations."

The Escalade tourist attraction and resort would have been located near the confluence of the Colorado and Little Colorado rivers and would have required more

than \$65 million from the Navajo Tribe for roads, water and power lines, and communications.

Director Leigh Kuwanwisiwma, who heads the Hopi Cultural Preservation Office, added that the site would have disturbed land where Hopi pilgrimages have been taken for more than a thousand years as part of a ritual initiation for Hopi young men. He added the proposed gondolas on either side of the confluence would go over the top of sites used for sacred ceremonies and construction of the Escalade would destroy Hopi sites. ###

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Hopi Tribal Council responds to questions by community members

August 14, 2017 - Moencopi Village Presentation

1. Why did Chairman and Vice Chairman’s offices not receive a cut?
 - *It was the Hopi Tribal Council’s decision to leave at 2017 level due to elections this year.*
2. Does the FY 2018 General Fund budget get approved before the new tribal leaders take seat?
 - *Yes*
3. When did Tribal Council start receiving fringe benefits?
 - *Around fiscal year 2012 during Leroy Shingoitewa’s term - Health, I.H.S. does not cover some entities off the reservation. This was implemented for Health benefits only, there are NO laws prohibiting this. Council benefits do not include the 401k Retirement, Social Security, Unemployment, Medicare, Medicaid, Life insurance, or Worker’s Compensation.*
4. Should HTC representatives consider strategic planning?
 - 1 at village level, one at tribal level; two pots of payment.
 - *Villages are responsible for their strategic planning including economic development. HTC along with key departments are responsible for the tribal government’s strategic planning.*
5. HTC representatives should be present at village presentations to explain questions regarding them.
 - *A lot of times HTC have other obligations that require their attendance.*
6. Village member recommends BOT stress to HTC that their involvement is important.
 - *During updates to Council, they are directly involved. For budget presentations, it is their prerogative.*
7. How much money allotted to HTC has actually been toward completing goals?
 - *Proposals are presented to Council for certain projects and long term goals. These are decided by resolution on a case by case basis. Some of these areas are land issues, water issues, health issues and other important items. HTC allocates funds to programs to provide the services to the Hope people.*
8. Village allocations are only enough to cover salaries & wages, there is no funding for projects.
 - *How Villages budget their funds are up to each Village/Board as what they prioritize for their Village. What is allotted to the Villages are what funds the Tribe can afford. There have been efforts by Council to establish other funding sources.*
9. BOT works on the budget and others work on re-organization, is there a team looking at personnel?
 - *Yes, Task Team 2 was created to work on these tasks.*
10. Village CSA recommends HTC not expend the Proceeds of Labor.
 - *These funds also fund the Villages.*
11. Can Chairman over rule the budget?
 - *No, Council has the authority as a whole.*
12. Questions are posed to candidates during election, but HTC represents the body of people?
13. Who does the lobbying?
 - *Sixkiller firm.*
14. Do they settle issues within that fiscal year?
 - *Lobbyist do not complete/settle issues, they advise and help get the issues known to the proper entities. Issues are completed by Council, decisions are made on a case by case basis. Some issues are not completed within a year.*
15. Why does the Chairman attend some major meetings alone, why not take delegates with him?
 - *Council members represent the tribe at meetings that they are assigned from committees or council directives; some are delegated to assist the Chairman.*
16. What is the tribe doing to assist villages that are not up to date with their audits?
 - *Shungopovi and Mishongnovi have been approved to receive their funds, this helps the Villages to pay for more audits services to complete their audits.*

August 15, 2017 – Hotevilla, Bacavi, Oraibi, Kykotsmovi Village Presentation

1. Fiscal Year 2017 some villages were allocated \$82,500, were audits complete? Where are the funds?
 - *Some audits were. The funds are within the Village budget.*
2. Who has the information for the remaining funds?
 - *Hopi Tribal Treasurer.*
3. If audits are complete, should our village provide us the information regarding the completion?
 - *Yes.*
4. Representatives and Administration do not know where our village funds are and what they are being expended on, this is causing confusion.
5. BOT needs to be on top of accountability.
6. Are concerns brought to villages?
 - *They should be by the Council Representatives from each Village.*
7. How much money was not spent by programs in previous years, is that information available?
 - *Information is available, requests can be made through the Tribal Secretary’s Office.*
8. Who has oversight of villages?
 - *Council has limited oversight over the Villages. When Council gets involved with Village issues, Villages are not cooperative. Villages issues that come up to Council are issues that are created within the Village.*
9. Village member recommends that funds be reported to villages.
 - *Village members should be informed of how the funds are being used by programs.*
10. Are general fund revenue projections set?
11. Legislative and Executive allocations are high, there are programs out there that need the funding, consider villages.
12. Chairman and Vice Chairman Offices are over staffed, decrease in staff can save.
13. Elderly services are important and needed, the closest place is the Hopi Assisted Living Facility but clients have to be capable of taking care of themselves.
14. Does Hopi Tribal Council get paid?
 - *Yes. They should be paid for meetings they attend.*
15. With the declining revenues, how are villages spending their funds?
16. Yu-Weh-Loo-Pahki, are they to continue funding annually?
 - *Yes*
17. Oraibi is recognized as a village but have no administrative operations, how do they continue to receive funding when audits are not complete?
 - *Constitution names the Villages that are to be assisted by the Tribe. The Village should have a large*

- amount of funds in an account specifically for the Village of Oraibi. The Finance department should have the figures of what that amount should be up to this date.*
18. When Hopi Tribal Council makes decisions they need to stand behind them.
 19. Hopi Tribal Council needs to give directives to villages since they are receiving tribal funding.
 - *Villages need to provide documentation of expended funds to village members. CSAs state it is the village money so village members have that right to know what funds are being used on.*
 20. For the last 4 years, Hotevilla village has not had any services done for the village.
 - *Internal issues must be resolved at the Village level. Completion of Audits has an effect on services provided. Villagers have stated that maybe if the Council takes back or does not fund the Village (Hotevilla) anymore, then the Village might reunite and harmony may be restored. Council needs to set rules (policies) and enforce them in order to prevent situations concerning funds that are not being properly managed.*
 21. How is the tribe getting ready for Peabody closure?
 - *Task Team One was directed to work with all parties involve with the closure of NGS to have Peabody or other mining company to continue to provide revenues to the Tribe from the sale of Tribe’s natural resources. Solar project along I-40 corridor could be a potential site to generate energy for sale to neighboring communities. Coal is the only really the resource that the Tribe can count on. The Tribe has to invest in upgrading all internal infrastructure within the Tribe’s offices, procedures, policies to ensure opportunities are available to the Tribe to pursue revenue generating projects.*

August 16, 2017 – Shungopavi, Mishongnovi, Sipaulovi Village Presentation

1. What happened to revenues?
 - *They are used for budgeting for programs within the Tribal government. Prior to Shingoitewa administration, Shwaab was doing a good job with investments. Switching to Morgan Keegan/Wachovia cost the Tribe a lot of money. What potentially could the Tribe have earned?*
2. NGS Closure/Peabody Coal; What is HTC doing or what has HTC done in recent years?
 - *This is a recent development that the Tribe is facing although the Tribe should have been seeking other resources and preparing for the future.*
3. A lot of money went to lawyer fees.
4. In 2013 – 45 attorneys on payroll, totaled \$34M.
5. What is the status on revenue generations/projects?
6. Villages to concentrate on essential services – trash, roads, water
7. Tribe’s lack of audits hampers grant apps and IDC.
 - *Yes*
8. Did HTC receive a pay raise?
 - *NO. Council has been at this level for a number of years. Council is approximately mid-level on the pay scale of the Tribe.*
9. LCR Litigation – Villages told HTC to stop process.
 - *This is for the future of water resources for the Hopi Tribe. Certain members of the Tribe wish to stop LCR Litigation. The Hopi Tribe continues to fight for the future of our People. The Tribe’s participation is very critical to what the outcome will be for the Tribe.*
10. Recommend “city” type “government services”.
 - *When you have city type services, they are funded by taxes. Follow infrastructure, put lines under the streets, this eliminates the process of going through individual land owners. Law enforcement would be a service that may be beneficial through “city” type government services. Especially given the large area that they currently patrol. HEPO has worked with Village clean ups in the past, Solid Waste program would be another program that could be utilized for this service. Solid Waste is providing this service, contact the Solid Waste program for more information.*

August 17, 2017 – Walpi, Sichomovi, Tewa, Yu-Weh-Loo-Pahki Village Presentation

1. Did everyone take the 12% reduction?
 - *No, the budget was reduced on the overall total.*
2. Recommend getting rid of HTC committees, there have been no reports to the public.
 - *Some Council representatives do report to their Village. Revision of Hopi Code is a long process due to other entities coming forth with issues that are not being addressed affectively. Individuals are not happy with the process or outcome.*
3. Navajo County declared plague, is the tribe prepared for emergencies like this?
 - *Health department does have community outreach and education programs in place to inform the people of health issues.*
4. Are the Revolving Accounts added together with the general funds to equal the 12% reduction?
 - *No*
5. HTC is receiving the highest budget, but we are not receiving reports from our village representatives.
6. Recommendations are input in the Tutuveni but these recommendations are not being addressed.
 - *Village comments and recommendations were addressed to Council on October 5, 2017.*
7. Letters are written but the public never receives a response.
8. Sichomovi Village is being penalized for audits, previous audits were not the current CSAs fault.
 - *The Board has the fiduciary responsibility and should ensure that all financial procedures are followed. Recommendation was made to Villages to come up with a policy, using the Tribe’s Financial Policies as a guide to come up with remedies to address the situations where the V*
9. Recommend that the community be involved in the Appropriations Language.
 - *What is it that the communities want to provide to the Appropriations Language? The CSA is the Village representative and they are involved and do have a representative on the BOT. CSA’s should be conveying the wishes of the people/village board, rather than their own personal opinions.*

“We’ve been funded as a sub grantee by the Arizona Department of Transportation (ADOT) since 1986, we’re currently in our 31st year of ADOT funding,” said Gomez. “We submit a grant every 2 years for Section 5311 funding. We also receive funding from the Hopi Department of Transportation’s (HDOT) Transportation Improvement Program as well as from the Federal Transit Administration’s Public Transportation on Indian Reservations Apportionments. These three funding sources make us 100% federally funded. We haven’t made a request from the Hopi General Fund for two years.”

The new 2017 Championship Defender is a 32-passenger bus and the largest in their fleet of 7 vehicles. The cost of the bus was \$157,638.25. ADOT paid for 90% of the cost and the Transit program paid for 10%. The bus was purchased as part of the vehicle replacement program.

“We will be purchasing two new smaller busses this year to replace the maroon busses we received in 2016,” said Gomez.

“The new bus graphics are actually part of our marketing and service branding plan,” said Gomez. “You may remember several years ago that our vehicles were plain white busses, one even had “Havasutransit” on the side. Our 23-passenger bus was a maroon color, so we decided to stay with that color as our riders could already identify with the color. In 2016 we received three new busses in the maroon color with our new Hopi Senom Transit logo on the side. This is what the branding of services is, so that people know who we are, what we do and what we look like. It’s kind of like McDonald’s – everybody knows what the Golden Arches look like, a 3-year old child can point out a McDonald’s to you and they know what’s there, what they serve and they like it because it’s consistent. Only thing is that Transit is better than McDonalds...! We’re ordering two more new busses the size of our smaller busses and we’ll be looking for new designs for these busses. The public is certainly welcome to suggest designs for the new busses.

August 17, 2017 – Walpi, Sichomovi, Tewa, Yu-Weh-Loo-Pahki Cont'd

10. Why are village audits due in June and programs in September?
11. Sichomovi does not have additional sources of funds.
12. Burial services should be considered to not have a reduction. Message was relayed to come to BOT and provide support for the services not to be reduced. Reply was that it wasn't their job, they are a recommending body. The department needs to assess their eligibility requirements for services. There are two different funding sources, each have different levels of funding available.
13. Recommend that CSAs be invited to draft the Appropriations Language.
 • *The CSA's do have representation on the BOT.*
14. HTC getting paid is breaking their own law, they receive salaries and paid benefits.
15. HTC Reps should be educated. An elementary class went to visit HTC Chambers and the topic of Election process was ridiculous.
16. Representatives should attend village meetings, where are they now?
 • *First Mesa, Consolidation is an issue, representatives have received letters stating that the Villages are not represented because the they are not voted for by the people.*

Other statements from Hopi Tribal Council

- *A lot of misinformation is being disseminated among the Hopi/Tewa Senom, this discredits the Hopi Tribal Council and all programs which are working for the best interest of the Hopi/Tewa people.*
- *Recommendation that Council be paid hourly and that they be paid from Village budgets. Villages would need to improve their administrative procedures to implement effective systems to provide this type of service.*
- *BOT's recommendation to cut Council's fringe benefits, it would be up to Council to decide. The perception of what is actually provided to Council and whether it was legal or not. Further information needs to be provided to Council as to how the payment of benefits for Council came about. For some this is the only health insurance available to the Council representatives. The Council is only afforded Health, Vision and Dental coverage. Recommendation to leave the benefits within the Council budget. Recommend to change to Health benefits and not Fringe benefits. Information requested for how much it will cost each rep for the benefits from outside sources.*
- *What we are discussing is the fact, level of available revenues are decreasing, but with the discussion today there are things that are being put back into the budget.*
- *Information of a 32hr work week vs a 40 hour work week. Benefit Committee would be the proper entity to provide this information.*
- *Task with cutting the budget that will not impact the people too much.*

Update: Native American Settlement Fund Extended

This past summer the Arizona Legislature extended the Native American Settlement Fund (NASF) to now include Arizona Native American veterans domiciled on their reservations while on active duty military in the years **1977 through 2005**. The new deadline to apply has been extended to December 31, 2019. This Fund was passed by the Arizona State Legislature last year.

Claimants: Who may make an NASF claim? Native American veterans who had Arizona income tax withheld from their active duty military pay while domiciled on their reservation. If the veteran is deceased the surviving spouse or personal representative may make a claim. If anyone other than the surviving spouse or personal representative (e.g., child of the veteran) makes a claim they must show the value of decedent’s estate was less than \$30,000.

Duration: What is the time window for NASF Claims?

- The Native American Veterans Income Tax Settlement Fund was established July 1, 2016.
- The Arizona Department of Veterans’ Services (ADVS) is designated as the recipient of claims.
- The Arizona Department of Veterans’ Services *may not accept claims after December 31, 2019*.
- The Arizona Department of Revenue (ADOR) *will not grant refunds after June 30, 2021*.
- Any monies left in the Native American Veterans Income Tax Settlement Fund on July 1, 2021 will be swept into the state general fund.

Claim Process: How does the NASF claim process work? The claimant sends their completed forms along with any relevant paperwork to the Arizona Department of Veterans’ Services (ADVS). ADVS has 210 days to accept or reject the claim. A non-response from ADVS after 210 days is considered a denial. Claims accepted by ADVS are next sent to the Arizona Department of Revenue (ADOR). ADOR has 210 days to approve or reject claims they receive from ADVS. ADOR will issue refunds to claimants with valid claims. If a claim has been denied by ADVS, you can reapply to ADVS or appeal the denial decision to the Director of the Department. If you choose to appeal, you must submit a written notice of appeal to the Director of the Department. The written notice shall include a concise statement of the reasons for the appeal. This decision is considered final thirty (30) days after receipt of the denial notice.

There are several ways AZ Native American Veterans can obtain the NASF application:

1. For those with internet access, go to www.dvs.az.gov website and look for the NASF ion. There you will find the applications for both living and deceased veterans with instructions on necessary forms to attach and the mailing address.
2. For local Veterans on/near the Hopi Reservation, they can stop by the Hopi Veterans Services office located in Kykotsmovi, AZ, to obtain the applications. Additionally, for Hopi Veterans registered with our office, you can obtain your DD Form 214, military discharge document.
3. For those Veterans who do not have their W-2s for the years claimed (1977 – 2005), there is a box to check on the NASF application to request AZ Department of Revenue to obtain on your behalf. Additionally, if Veterans do not have a DD Form 214, military discharge document, fill out the SF Form 180 that is included with the application form. Your military records will be mailed directly to ADVS.
4. Finally, there is a section on the NASF application form requiring a Tribal official to attest Veterans home of record on tribal land. For Hopi Veterans, the Hopi Veterans Services is the Hopi Tribal delegate to sign the section. For non-Hopi Veterans, they will need to contact their respective Tribal governor, president or designee to determine who signs the home of record section.

Don’t forget, as mentioned the deadline date to file your NASF claim is December 31, 2019. We hope all AZ Native Veterans take the opportunity to file a NASF claim and to help spread the word to others in your local communities. Public Presentations on the proposed changes to the National Eagle Repository as presented by the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service

The Hopi Wildlife & Ecosystems Management Program will be hosting three public presentations on the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Services (USFWS) Office of Law Enforcement Service (OLES) proposed changes to the National Eagle Repository (NER) policy. The proposed changes to the current policy may have benefit the Hopi Tribe interests in applying and obtaining Bald and Golden eagle feathers and parts from the National Eagle Repository. The Hopi Tribe would like to solicit comments and feedback from Tribal members on a survey that would be used to provide official comments to the USFWS Law Enforcement Service regarding the proposed changes.

The presentations will cover the reasons why the USFWS OLES is proposing changes to the current policy and other important topics:

- USFWS OLES proposal from a Native American Tribe to operate the NER.
- USFWS OLES proposal to delegate authority from the USFWS to Tribes to process applications and allow the Tribes to decide who is authorized to receive Eagle feathers for Tribal Enrolled Members.
- Recent court decision that allows Non-Federally recognized Tribes, State Recognized Tribes and non-Native American/Indians eligible to apply and use Bald and Golden eagled feathers from the NER.
- Submit comments and feedback on the above items.

- November 14, 2017, 6:30 pm - 9 pm Tuesday, Hotevilla Youth and Elderly Center.

Hopi Health and Wellness Coalition advocates living a healthy, pure and good life

The Hopi Health and Wellness Coalition’s vision is to be advocates for the Hopi community by ensuring that programs that provide activities and services are successful in promoting health and disease prevention; creating future healthy generations. *“Itam, Hopi Health and Wellness Coalition, yep sinmuy amungam lolmat katsit na’nawaqna-sosoyum suphelaukyakyang katsit yesni.”* We are the Hopi Health and Wellness Coalition, our mission is to work for the betterment of the Hopi people, we want all people to live a healthy, pure, and good life.

The Hopi Health & Wellness Coalition, with the help of the Good Health & Wellness in Indian Country Grant and the Hopi Tobacco Program, are working towards reducing the usage of commercial tobacco and decrease exposure to secondhand tobacco smoke.

“Fifty years ago Dr. Luther Terry shocked the nation when he released the first Surgeon General’s report that linked smoking to lung cancer and heart disease. In January, the 32nd Surgeon General’s Report on smoking and health was released. The new report provides more evidence of the serious damage smoking does to the human body. It also commemorates the anniversary of that first report that laid the foundation for today’s programs to reduce the disease and death caused by smoking. Over time science has shown that people who smoke cigarettes are much more likely to develop – and die from – certain diseases than people who don’t smoke. Despite Dr. Terry’s warning, more than 20 million Americans have died from smoking since the first report in 1964. Most of these deaths were of adults with a history of smoking but two and a half million were of nonsmokers who died because they breathed air that was polluted by other people’s cigarette smoke. More than 100,000 of the smoking-related deaths were of babies who died from Sudden Infant Death Syndrome or other health conditions caused by parental smoking, particularly by the mother. Despite these sad and sobering numbers, smoking is still the leading cause of preventable disease and death in the nation.” – United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

In May 2017, the programs collaborated together to host a Student Art Contest, open to any student, Kindergarten to High School on the Hopi reservation. There were 12 pieces of art work selected from the art contest submissions, which will be used in an anti-commercial tobacco media campaign. Posters will be created from the art work and distributed across the Hopi reservation at public locations. The theme of the contest was “Hopi Piva vs. Pahan Piva”. As Hopis, we utilize piva in our ceremonies and have kyaptsi for it. Pahan piva is ka-hopi and is not indigenous to our culture. The winners of the contest expressed their views through their art work showing the important significance of Hopi piva versus the dangers of commercial tobacco.

There were eight winners from First Mesa Elementary School: Tyler Huma, Kyleigh Huma, Kallee Lomayestewa, Theron Huma, Maliya Gishie, Lomawisiwma Huma, Antonio Aguilera and Suyma Maho. The additional four winners were students from Moenkopi Day School: Kaleb Bitsui, Brandon Nez, Wilford Gaseoma and Britt Bradley. Each student received a Nike backpack for their entry. Their art work will be posted in January and each month after in the Hopi Tutuveni. Thank you students for your submissions; we hope you continue to advocate about the dangers of commercial tobacco. Local Published Author shares “A Warrior’s Mindset”

On September 27, 2017, Michael Adams a member of the Hopi tribe celebrated the arrival of his first published book, “A Warrior’s Mindset –

The Training Guide to Develop a Mindset for Greatness.” Adams who graduated from Hopi Jr./Sr. High School, pursued his bachelor’s at Occidental College in Los Angeles, and received his masters from Northern Arizona University in School Counseling, created his book with the intention of sharing its wisdom with Native Youth. “Working as a counselor in various reservation schools over the past few years helped me realize a need for a mindset shift among our young leaders of tomorrow. I am now certain that our Native Youth have everything in them to completely transform their future and it starts with their mindset. I intend to speak to as many Native students as possible to share what I have learned, with the full intention of impacting the future of our Native communities. I chose the word “Warrior” because this term speaks of one who walks their own path with courage, strength, and humility; and carries the welfare of his/her people in their heart. I believe our indigenous people can all relate to this person because he/she already lives within each of us. The book cover speaks directly to our indigenous roots of beauty representing the mind and all its beauty and unknown potential,” shared Adams.

A Warrior’s Mindset is a collection of 102 quotes, from various success leaders, geared towards cultivating a growth mindset. Adams stated, “The process is simple, read the quote for the day, answer and reflect on the questions for yourself, then journal your responses. Remember, if you want different results in your life, you have to take different actions. Making this a daily practice will get you on course for success.” He added, “the book writing process took over a month filled with long nights, however the feeling of holding your book in your hand is like no other.” He is currently working on the audio book for “A Warrior’s Mindset” and will release it soon. Adams intends to develop some future training to increase Native authors in native country.

Adams shared his first motivational talk to the students at Tuba City High School on September 21st. He is set to return back to Tuba City for a book signing with the students. “His ability to connect with students and share some helpful inspiration was great for the students. It also showed a young example of success that growing up within reservation conditions doesn’t determine your future,” shared Principal McCabe. “The word “Compassion,” which means to have an awareness of the sufferings of others and take action toward alleviating another’s sufferings is the mission I want to fulfill in life. We need to understand that our circumstances, problems, hardships, and obstacles in life are not the roadblock, what we believe about those roadblocks is what holds us back,” shared Adams.
